

### **President's Preamble**

In the last Newsletter I wrote that I saw a glimmer of sunshine just over the hill. Well, after a few bumps in the road, that day finally dawned in July and we were allowed to commence ringing again in a very careful, risk assessed way.

It has been great to get out and about again, to ring 'properly' as well as virtually on Ringing Room, and to meet friends who it seems we have been avoiding for months. I hope you will all have an opportunity to ring in your local towers in the very near future.

It was really great to have our first Guild "Not the Spring Meeting" in Northampton: some 30 members attended that rather damp August day. The weather might have failed us but at least the welcome was warm and the ringing brisk. Many thanks to Giles Willson and Clare Dean of Northampton Branch for setting it all up with the Church – and doing the extra careful cleaning up afterwards!

You may be aware that the Guild has bought a CO<sub>2</sub> meter so that Members can check the adequacy of the ventilation in any Tower while they are ringing, and thus update their Church risk assessment. Please contact John Beresford (steward@pdg.org.uk) to borrow the meter.

I recently borrowed it when I rang a couple of Quarter Peals: we rang at one church with ground floor ringing chamber, high ceiling and open arch to church. With the west door open the maximum was 550ppm, well short of the warning level of 800ppm. Our next church, also ground floor, medium height ceiling and just the west door open, gave a maximum of 750ppm, just short of the warning level. It has given me a better idea of what to look for when planning more ringing days. Of more concern was that when I was trying out the meter at home it shot up to 1800ppm (danger level?) while just 2 of us watched TV! My windows are now open.

The Guild is here to support you as you restart ringing – please do let the Officers know what we can do to help you in any way. Please contact Helen Allton (secretary@pdg.org.uk) if you need advice or help with risk assessments.

I hope all towers will seriously consider calling out the Guild "Flying Squad" to help you at practices during this critical period when we are all struggling to remember how to handle a rope as well as how those called changes and methods went. Contact Simon Dixon (master@pdg.org.uk) to activate the 'blue lights' heading towards you.

Thank you to all those who led and attended the Virtual Training sessions held over Easter – the presentations are available on the Guild website under Home -> Learn to Ring -> Training Resources. Do take a moment to dip in and see what help and support is available there.

I am really looking forward to getting out and about around the Guild again this winter, hopefully attending Branch meetings in person this time.

As ringing is restarting, bands and individuals may find that they need some extra support in order to progress. The Flying Squad is a group of ringers there to help. There are several ways in which we can help. Those listed below are only suggestions:

- Help to ring a quarter peal by supplementing the band
- Providing a conductor for a quarter peal
- Experienced support for a training session
- Help for a limited period for a band looking to progress to the next step.

### Treasurer's Call - New 21st Century Fund Raising

The world is a different place in the 21st century than we were all used to. There are new forms of fundraising alongside the familiar shaking of charity tins at the supermarket, organising fun runs/cycling events and writing affiliation letters. The world of online shopping presents an alternative way. Online retailers are now looking for new ways to drive activity to their web pages and they are offering opportunities for shoppers to donate to charities. However, there is also a risk that the retailers may be using your data and spending patterns to try to influence advertisements that they will send to you and potentially sell to third parties. You need to be mindful of this, and potential criminal use of data, so I would counsel not giving information on maiden names, education, date or place of birth, or anything that could be misused if the data was sold on.

There are 3 approaches that I am currently looking at:

**Amazon Smile** – By using this special portal rather than the normal Amazon website, they pay your selected charity 0.5% of all relevant purchases. The only additional information you will be giving up is your preferred charity.

**Give as You Live** – Similar, but open to over 4,500 shopping websites. This asks you to provide more information on choices and renewal dates. For each purchase the portal tells you how much they will give your charity. Be aware that the same amount goes to the company running the service.

**Charities Aid Foundation** – They operate a Give As You Earn scheme (better than Gift Aid for higher-rate taxpayers; roughly doubling the value of donations). It involves a salary sacrifice scheme, which is not for all. They also offer fund raising support with simple Gift Aid facilities.

I will be putting together detailed FAQ documents to tell you how you can access these schemes and will be adding them to the Guild Donations page www.pdg.org.uk/homepage/content-2/donations as I find out more. I can confirm that the Guild has benefitted to the tune of £250 from the GAYE Scheme for the training fund, plus £5.29 from Amazon, with another £3.65 to come!

### The Webmaster's Wanderings



The new Guild website can be found at www.pdg.org.uk. It is full of useful information about the Guild, contacts for towers, branch information, and latest news.

This was introduced during the Spring. At the beginning of the year, Geoff Pullin, the webmaster, received information that BT would stop supporting the free BT community sites on which the Guild website had run for many years. This was a concern, as the Guild's website is a major part of the Guild's visible presence. After debate at the GMC, the decision was made to migrate to a new site, at www.pdg.org.uk. This also meant a change of Webmaster, with Richard Allton taking over as general technical wizard (although that is not the official title).

The same issue also affected the Guild inventory of bells, published by Rob Palmer, again using the BT hosting service. His work has now been made available as it was, under the link www.inventory.pdg.org.uk.


These forced changes brought with them some new opportunities. Some members have already noticed that there is a member login facility. The intention is to provide information (limited at present) which is restricted to members of the Guild. This can also function as a mailing list, which is certainly of interest. Watch this space...

Probably the most important function of the website is to provide contact information, both for towers and branches.

For all contacts, the name will be listed, along with one piece of contact information, in order of preference: e-mail address, telephone or a mail address. The e-mail addresses are all protected such that while they are human readable, they are not easily harvested by spam bots, thus protecting contacts from spam mailings.

All the Guild officers and the public branch officers now have generic role-based e-mail addresses for use on the website and in the annual report. Each branch has its own prefix e.g. office@branch.pdg.org.uk. For example, the chairman of the Wellingborough branch is

chairman@wellingborough.pdg.org.uk. These are normally forwarded to the role-holder's own e-mail address, or even to more than one person if roles are shared. This has the advantage that on the change of e-mail address or role holder, the forwarding can be changed quickly, and address books and links always remain current.



GDPR permission forms are now collated centrally by the Guild Secretary, who will act as a point of reference for these permissions for both the website and annual report. There is an updated permissions form which can be completed and returned electronically, hopefully making capturing these more convenient.

The website remains, as ever, a

work in progress. Initially the aim was simply to transfer information from the BT site to the new site. Now that this has been accomplished, other changes are being made. Each tower now has a What3Words location, as well as a link to a map and the tower's Dove information. Images of towers are always appreciated, so please take one of your tower and send it in.

A final thank you to Geoff for his sterling work setting up and maintaining the previous website. Much of what he created has simply been re-used.

### **Recent Guild Events**

### Tolling for HRH Prince Phillip, RIP

Coordinated arrangements had been put in place within government, the Central Council and the Diocese, to guide our ringing: half-muffled tolling or chiming of a single bell on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> April at noon, 99 times or up to 5 minutes; 8 days of official mourning, during which any other ringing should be half-muffled and in accordance with current Covid-19 restrictions; half-muffled tolling or chiming of a single bell on the day of the funeral, Saturday, 17<sup>th</sup> April.

162 towers in the diocese tolled, chimed, or otherwise marked the death and funeral of Prince Philip. Letters were sent to the Bishop of Peterborough and to the Lords Lieutenant of Northamptonshire and Rutland, the Queen's representative in each of the counties, to inform them of this achievement.

### [Not the] Spring Festival - Rain did not stop play!

It may have rained heavily in Northampton on Saturday 21st August 2021, but it didn't prevent a fine afternoon meeting of the Guild, the first for nearly 2 years.

About 30 members braved the elements for an informal gathering at Abington Church where suitable Covid-19 precautions were taken.



It was a wonderful opportunity to catch up on news and ring a variety of methods from Plain Bob Doubles to Carlisle Surprise Minor.

### **Calendar Competition**

For the 100th anniversary, in 2024, the Guild will be producing a calendar for the year, decorated with images of churches within the Peterborough Diocese.

The calendar will be produced with images in landscape format. Many towers may look better in portrait than landscape, so submissions can be a single landscape image or a selection of images of a single church to produce a collage. Images may be an external view of the church or tower, of the bells or installation,



or architectural features of the church - be as inventive and artistic as you like. Images of a vibrant town centre church would be as interesting as an idyllic country church in a peaceful landscape. Images showing different seasons are particularly welcomed.

Pictures must be of churches within the boundaries of the Peterborough diocese with three or more bells hung for ringing. The bells do not need to be ringable. For ideas about towers, see the Towers section of the Guild website.

The competition is open to anyone and closes on the 1st September 2022, with winners to be announced at the Summer Festival that month. The three best images, as judged by the 100th Anniversary Committee, will be the recipient of a 100th Anniversary Calendar each for the photographer and for the tower pictured.

#### The small print:

Images need to be in jpeg or png or equivalent format.

Images must be submitted by e-mail to <a href="mailto:photos100@pdg.org.uk">photos100@pdg.org.uk</a>, including the name of the photographer, the church, and the month/season they were taken.

Files should be at least 3000 pixels in the longest side, typically more than 2 MB in size.

Images must have been taken by you and contain no text, watermarks, or other annotations

You must have permission of any identifiable person in the image to submit the image.

By submitting an image, you agree to release the photo under a Creative Commons Attribution. This allows PDG, media or any other organisation to use the photo freely, with appropriate credit to the photographer.

### **Peregrine Falcons at Higham Ferrers**

The elegant crocketed spire of St Mary Virgin, Higham Ferrers rises to 170 feet above ground level. The tower houses a fine 22cwt ring of ten following restoration and augmentation in 2014. It is also home to a family of peregrine falcons. They are magnificent large birds, the fastest moving of all living creatures, with a wingspan well over a metre. They nest on cliffs and the like, but if none is available, tall church towers are next best, and so peregrines are to be seen around Worcester and Norwich Cathedrals, and of course many other churches.



In 2014, just as the bells were being removed to Loughborough, a pair of peregrines made the spire their home. Word quickly spread, and people came from near and far to see and photograph them. The decision was made to install a suitable box for them to nest, although we knew it would take some time for them to be willing to use it.

Sadly, the peregrines left and the work seemed to have been in vain with the box being used just by pigeons. However, they returned earlier this year and quickly moved into the box. Since then, hordes of watchers and photographers have come to see them. In April, as one photographer described it, they put on



a regular "porn show" up the spire, so it was no surprise that chicks hatched in May, four in all. Peregrines are certainly not quiet birds, and the time while the chicks were growing was one of almost continuous screeching from above.

One chick was almost lost when it

fluttered to the ground during one of its early attempts at flight, and then made no attempt to fly again, being seemingly resigned to its fate. We decided that we may as well try to take it back up the tower and were very surprised that it offered no resistance to being picked up. We released it on the church roof, and watched it run the roof's full length. A peregrine's running gait is like something from a child's tv cartoon, bouncing left and right, but the pleasing

thing was to see it being fed by its parents shortly afterwards, none the worse for its ordeal.

Although the parents are still around, noisy as ever, the chicks have now left to make their way in the world. Our next plan is to install one or possibly two webcams in the sides of the box, hoping that we can watch another brood next year in more detail.

### **OBITUARIES**

#### Peter J Chilton

As lockdown came in March 2020 Peter was diagnosed with cancer and died on 2nd May 2021 aged 75. Covid-19 restrictions meant that ringing at Wilbarston, his home tower, ceased in late February 2020. Regulations were relaxed for Christmas Day 2020 and Peter rang with two others (socially distanced) for a short time after the midnight service. It was the last time he rang there.



Peter and Alyson came to Wilbarston some eight or nine years ago. He had been an enthusiastic ringer in his youth in Leicester but had not rung for many decades. On arriving, Peter started to ring again and set out to teach others. He had great skill in this, being patient, encouraging and always looking for high standards. He taught weekly at Ashley and then under him weekly practices at Wilbarston re-commenced, where he introduced interesting ringing exercises. Sunday ringing took place, and many learnt to ring. His vision was the project, which he masterminded, to re-hang and augment the existing five bells; this would make this easier to learn on as well as enabling more varied ring.

The re-hanging of the bells was a major project involving many personal contacts, much telephone and paperwork as well as the physical work to

prepare the bells for removal to the Taylor's foundry at Loughborough and getting them up again when they were returned. He also managed the fundraising (£33,671.34p) for this. He led the team of Wilbarston bellringers in this work and in the fundraising, which included a packed gig at the village hall helped by the bellringers. Remarkably it took only two years of hard work for all this to be achieved, aided by Murray Coleman, Nick Churchman and Andy Bimson (and the bell hanger Neil).



There was a big celebration in July 2018, on Peter's birthday, two years to the day after the PCC had given its approval for the work. The church was packed with ringers from the Benefice and Guild for this.

The village has much to thank Peter for; he will be sadly missed. But he has left a beautiful ring of bells, a re-ordered bell chamber and re-ordered ground ringing chamber. It is fitting that his ashes

will be interred beneath the tower he did so much for. At his funeral on 21<sup>st</sup> May a band of six ringers (from Wilbarston, Ashley and Stoke Albany), some of whom had not touched a rope for 15 months, rang the bells half-muffled as a tribute to Peter. Ringers from Ashley stood in the churchyard as a tribute to him.

Ruth Doyle writes: Thinking of our dear, talented, dedicated, musical friend. It's been an honour and a privilege to play music together the last few years. Wilbarston appreciates all you've done for us; our church bells will always remind us of you. Rest now.

#### Janet Collins

We had the sad news that Janet Collins died, aged 65, on April 10 from her sister, Alison Willgress. Janet had been in LOROS Hospice in Leicester. She joined the Guild in 1968 at Nether Heyford, rang her first peal in 1971, was a Branch Committee member 1977-9, ordained priest at Banbury in 1994 and received her 50 year Guild membership certificate in 2018. Her duties took her away from her home and she served in the dioceses of Peterborough, Oxford,



St Albans and Newcastle. Jan's funeral on May 6 was subject to Covid-19 regulations, with which we have all become too familiar, with very restricted attendance.

### **Rosemary Davidson**

Rosemary passed away peacefully at home on May 28. After retiring in Northern Ireland, Ernie and Rosemary moved to Hellidon. Rosemary set about organising the funding and pushed through the restoration and augmentation of Hellidon bells in 1991 from a derelict four to a good five. The PCC named the new treble "Rosemary" (without her knowledge) in her honour and now to her memory.

Rosemary started to learn to ring with seven others at a special branch organised teach-in evening held at Priors Marston in August 1991. After a lull in village ringing, Rosemary initiated a Tuesday morning Hellidon practice with

refreshments in 2006. I was under very clear instruction that there was to be no pressure to learn methods! The practices have attracted many people until stopped abruptly by Covid-19 in March 2020. Although Rosemary, 91, had not rung for several years, she continued as a keen listener and gave her comments on striking with due Ulster vigour as well as keeping a critical eye on the quality of the cake!

### James (Jimmy) Cameron

Jimmy joined the Grand Union Benefice Bell ringers in January 2014 as a lapsed ringer, having learned to ring at Whittlebury in his youth. He very quickly became a very valuable and competent ringer of the band, ringing at all the Benefice Churches.

He shared in the weekly scramble from Blisworth, usually in one vehicle, to Milton Malsor, Stoke Bruerne or Alderton on a Sunday for 9am ringing for the 9.30 service, and then back to Blisworth for some breakfast and a comfort break before ringing at 10.30am at Blisworth or Grafton Regis.

Jim's greatest personal achievement in the belfry was to ring a quarter peal at the 2018 Canal Festival with ringers from Bobbing in Kent who brought a Mini-Ring of Bells to the festival.

A keen Cobblers fan, he was frequently teased about the wrong shaped ball by the Saints fans in the team, and the performance of both were the subject of many discussions during the winter months. Unfortunately, Jimmy only enjoyed a very short, busy retirement before falling ill. It was such a pleasure to meet him, Jane and Daisy when out for a walk in the village. Jimmy was a true gentleman, greatly missed by his friends in the belfry.

### **News from the Branches**

#### CULWORTH BRANCH

The bells remained silent for so many months apart from perhaps the occasional tolling for a funeral. Nearly all the towers in the branch tolled a bell in remembrance of HRH Prince Philip in April.

We managed to hold our branch half AGM, (minus tea), at Croughton in July where we said farewell to our branch treasurer, Geoffrey Stretton, and wished him well in his new home and tower. We thanked him for all the work he had

done in the branch over the years. Paul Bennett from Evenley will be taking over as Treasurer.

The break we had due to Covid-19 has taken its toll on our ringing activities. Only about half our towers in the branch have commenced ringing and some of our older members have not returned yet. #### DAVENTRY BRANCH

#### **Virtual Meetings**

The lockdown that started on Boxing Day for Coronavirus prevented any opportunity to meet and ring until Easter and then only under severe restrictions. This typically meant going back to ringing alternate bells with no bystanders, well sanitised hands, doors and windows open, face coverings, not swapping bells and for shorter periods. Branch events took the form of Zoom gatherings.

We had a Zoom quiz on March 13 with thanks to Shirley Waterhouse for setting it up and Leanne Martin for hosting. I counted 28 folk flitting across my screen. The winners were Bob and Maureen Sinclair of Newnham followed closely by Nikki Butt of Welton.

On May 8 we held the 'Not the Branch Coach Outing' Zoom gathering. I think 19 plus two cats presented themselves, with Leanne making short appearances from a marina in Southampton. Jane was handed control and sorted a successful break-out time, including a Ringing Room session. It gave us a chance to catch up with one another.

The next Zoom gathering was the Guild's AGM on June 12. If it had not been via Zoom, we were scheduled to host it at Weedon, so we were let off! It began with prayers pre-recorded by the Rural Dean of Daventry (Revd Stephen Burrows at Heyford) and we remembered members who died since the last AGM, rather more than is comfortable.

Following the closure of BT's free community websites, the branch website was replaced with the snappy www.gcsspullin.wixsite.com/daventrybranch in May, a temporary free measure until editorial access to the Guild website can be extended.

The Branch Committee decided in July that it was too soon to restart ringing meetings so organised a picnic in August and a walk in September instead. The Picnic was held on August 22 in the Bugbrooke Sunday School Rooms garden. Twelve turned up for a pleasant picnic - see photo of the company during a dry spell, otherwise there were two groups! Thanks to Gwynneth White for organising and taking the photo.



#### **Special Events**

The Church of England and the Marie Curie organised a day of reflection, to mark a year since we entered lockdown, for Tuesday, March 23. Bellringers were invited to mark the end of the one-minute silence by tolling a bell at 12.01pm. I tolled Daventry tenor 88 times, being the atomic number of Radium, discovered by Marie Curie in 1898; Braunston, Welton & Ashby also tolled and Barby tolled 88.

The vast programme of vaccinations soon got underway. Branch Steward Brian Foley offered to carry out inspections of towers to check that all was in order before ringing, which was able to restart for services at Easter if agreed by the incumbent. Ringing was back to last autumn's arrangements.

The following Friday the mood changed with the sad news of the death of HRH Prince Philip.

I am aware of some highlights: Badby (99 half-muffled whole pulls), Barby (99 times), Byfield (tolling), Daventry (99 half-muffled whole pulls), Flore (tolling), Great Brington (Justin 99 tolled 5th, Hannah counted & safety), Kislingbury (John tolled 99), Newnham (Bob rang 99 blows of tenor), Preston Capes (tolled the 3rd 99 times or it may have been more! - it was accompanied by several dogs in the village who had forgotten what bells sound like), Weedon (Brian tolled tenor half muffled 99 times and for 15 minutes prior to the funeral), Whilton (Miles rang tenor 99 times, Theresa counted & safety).

At a Daventry wedding on April 17 the bride was welcomed in with tolling and left to half-muffled ringing, as required by the guidelines!

CCCBR asked for support for "NHS, Social Care & Frontline Workers' Day", ringing at 8pm on Monday, July 5, the 73<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of the founding of the NHS. It was celebrated by at least Ashby St Ledgers, Barby and Preston Capes.

#### **Getting Back to Ringing**

On May 17 came 'Step 3'. The Rule of Six indoors and with a 1m apart allowance some practices could start after a 14 month gap. Short practices with six nominated ringers began soon after at Daventry and Badby, where the first touches of Plain Bob and Grandsire Doubles had one neighbour emailing: 'Glorious to hear!". For the record, on June 29, a course each of Stedman Doubles and Cambridge S Minor was rung for the first time since 2020 at Daventry practice. The performers were still not used to the music produced by 1 3 5 7 9 10!

Some national movement of ringers was noted when a group of six in a Covid-19 secure bubble from London joined Narrow Boat Blueline (!) on July 10 for a week starting off from Napton. Six quarter peals, including two a week apart at Badby, were successful and only Dodford beat them.

A somewhat less exuberant than originally anticipated 'Step 4' started on July 19 as a rising number of new infections were reported. The Bishop passed the baton back to incumbents for ringing decisions as legal prohibitions had been removed.

A crop of pent-up weddings led to activity in several belfries from July.

Practices have continued or started up with variations in precautions depending on local circumstances. Most practice nights will have restarted by the beginning of September.

#### People

At the end of March, Michael Haighton had an ablation to his liver which has allowed his oncologist to declare him cleared successfully. This was followed by cataract operations. He was thus thankful to be able to ring again for the first time in 19 months at Kilsby in August.

Clare Glover was ordained Deacon on June 27 and has been appointed Assistant Curate of Kettering. Clare assisted with our Branch service at Daventry in September 2020. Her husband James rings at Kilsby and inherited Peter Box's handbells. He told us that the family was settling in, and Clare has been up the tower to discuss the resident peregrine falcons with the local bird of prey society. However, James is still living in Kilsby during the week as he got a job recently designing trains in Southam, so he hasn't had a chance for a ring yet.

Jackie Gibbard has been suffering considerably for a few years, with us all concerned that there was no diagnosis. Covid-19 stopped investigations until she was taken to A&E Walsgave by ambulance on July 3 after further intense pain. She was eventually diagnosed with vitamin B12 deficiency due to an earlier major operation, which has led to deterioration of nerve sheaths. Lately

she has been shuttled between A&E, Rugby St Cross and Overslade House. She remains in pain and we all hope that the effect of B12 treatment will soon show.

We welcome the Revd David Battison, who was licensed via Zoom in July as Team Vicar in the Daventry Team with special responsibility for Catesby, Hellidon and Staverton.

#### KETTERING BRANCH

The return to ringing following the relaxation of restriction following the Covid-19 Pandemic has been a gradual one rather than a massive rush back into the towers.

The Branch held its first post 'Lock-down' committee meeting by Zoom on the afternoon of Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> August.

The meeting was attended by the Guild Secretary Helen Allton. The principal items on the agenda were the re-establishing a programme of monthly ringing meetings and the proposed arrangements to celebrate the Guild Centenary.

Arrangements are now underway with a programme of monthly ringing meetings starting with visits jointly to Rushton, All Saints, a new set of ropes having been recently installed, and Geddington St Mary Magdelene on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> September.

As the Guild is intending to hold monthly events throughout 2024 to celebrate the Centenary on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday of every month, and as this will clash with the regular Kettering Branch monthly meetings, the committee will seek the approval of the Branch members to move the Kettering Branch monthly meetings to the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of the month at the AGM in 2022.

The area received a visit from the University of London Society of Change Ringers for its Nene Valley Tour from 13<sup>th</sup> -17<sup>th</sup> August. The tour was organised by Rhys Skillman who is a Kettering ringer outside of term time. The tour took in towers in the Thrapston, Wellingborough, Kettering and Northampton Branches and made an excursion to the "Twin Towers" of Rugby St. Andrew on the Monday. Due to reduced numbers, the visiting band were supported by a

number of local ringers over the course of the tour, with the ringing ranging from Rounds and Call changes through to attempts at Surprise methods.

I am most grateful to all the correspondents who have kept me informed on what is happening in their own tower as detailed below.

#### Ashley, St. Mary The Virgin

With four upcoming summer weddings a smaller Ashley band decided on a practise on 21 and 28 June. With Rule of 6, facemasks and hand sanitiser in place we were pleased to practise and felt confident to confirm the ringing at the weddings if they were able to go ahead. Our bells had previously been inspected on 15 April and a single bell tolled for the Duke of Edinburgh on 17 April. As lockdown regulations eased, we decided to re-start our weekly Monday practises on Monday 19 July. Our first Sunday ring takes place on Sunday 29 August. The upcoming plan is for teaching from Nick and Helen once a month, and when needed on request. Our smaller group of seven ringers are keen to improve and we are currently trying to ring up and down in peal. We also like to support other churches in the benefice when needed. From mid-September we hope to encourage back a few more Ashley ringers to re-join our weekly practises and co-ordinate this with the support of Nick and Helen. Of course, we will all miss Peter Chilton who was a great supporter and teacher in Ashley.

#### Corby, St. John

Corby Tower is back with its practice evening on Wednesdays from 6.30 to 7.15, with 7.25 ringing down at the latest. There is an evening church service from 7.30pm which doesn't appear to be changing yet so we are not ringing beyond 7.25pm for the time being.

Corby has no restrictions on who can come and ring providing, of course, that they do not have any symptoms of Covid-19 and have had at least one vaccine as most of the band have had two.

#### **Cottingham St. Mary Magdelene**

The tower not having a regular band, the Branch Secretary pulled together a band of visitors to ring for a wedding on Friday 6th August.

The Branch Steward, Andy Bimson has since visited to inspect the Belfry and made recommendations as to required works.

#### **Cransley, St Andrew**

In the well-ventilated ground floor ringing chamber practice night has resumed on Tuesdays at 7pm with unlimited numbers.

Three band members have announced that they won't be returning so we have vacancies, especially for weddings.

The rector has intimated on several occasions that she likes the bells to be rung, so whilst some towers have to impose limits, St Andrew opens its ringing chamber to all local ringers and can be on any night by arrangement.

The tower held its AGM on Tuesday 10th August, and on a pleasant evening congregated outside in the church yard. The meeting was attended by the Rector the Reverend Nicki Hobbs. The proposal to formally revert to practices on Tuesday evening was confirmed and following the election of officers, measures to recruit new ringers were discussed.

#### Desborough, St. Giles

Desborough has been able to ring for services with a single ringer using the Ellacombe chimes. Initially practice ringing was held at Brampton Ash St. Mary and was restricted to 6 ringers on a rota basis.

The practice has now moved back to Desborough, numbers being restricted to local band members with a maximum of 10 people in the belfry, with face masks to be worn and duration of ringing restricted to 1hr 15 mins maximum. Ringers are asked to take care in the ringing chamber as it is probably the smallest & least well ventilated in the county!

#### **Great Oakley St. Michael**

Diane Talbot rang the treble bell 73 times on Monday 5th July.

The local band have started ringing again on the occasional Saturday mornings at 10-30 am for 45minutes. The first wedding on which the bells were rung was on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> July.

The installation of the 2 new treble bells which was delayed from 2020 is due to take place in the near future, with the frames having already being made by Matthew Higby.

#### Isham, St. Peter

Starting at 8pm on July 5th the treble was chimed 73 times, then all of the band joined in on 6 bells for rounds and 6 firing...followed by more rounds.

Return to ringing was painless after a TRULY impressive risk assessment (thanks to Helen) which was submitted to the churchwardens and rector. Ringing has returned on every practice night since May 17th and we are in our stride, ringing St Martin's, St Simons, Antelope and Finchampstead!

The new rector was installed on July 30th and attended the practice on July 12th to meet the ringers and join them at The Lilacs afterwards! Isham has also benefited from the Guild Ringing Master's "Flying Squad". Cathy and Simon Dixon having assisted in training a recruit to the tower.

#### Rothwell, Holy Trinity

Service ringing started after the general removal of restrictions with limited numbers and face coverings worn due to the limited ventilation in the ringing chamber.

The Wednesday evening practice has recommenced but is restricted to members of the local band for the time being.

#### Wilbarston, All Saints

Wilbarston have returned to ringing practice on a Tuesday night - all welcome. Service ringing as required.

It was with great sadness that we heard of the death of the Wilbarston Tower Captain, Peter Chilton earlier this year (see Obituaries section of this Newsletter).

I hope you have found this up-date of interest and that there will be a lot more activity to report in Spring 2022




#### **Ringing School**

#### PETERBOROUGH BRANCH

The first ring of all the bells in 2021 was half-muffled for a funeral in mid-May, and after that we restarted Monday practices and ringing for Sunday service, limiting the numbers to 6 ringers on a rota, allowing the whole band to get used to ringing the bells again.

In mid-July, we returned to normal practices on Monday evenings and Friday mornings, with some level of precautions, such as wearing masks, and it has been lovely to welcome so many ringing friends back into the Tower.

We were pleased to be able to ring for the induction of the new vicar in July and have very gradually resumed




full practices after a few weeks of only having 6 selected ringers at any one time.

#### RUTLAND BRANCH

It is so good to be ringing again after the long lay-off. Most of Rutland's towers are ringing now, with just a few exceptions, Oakham All Saints being one. A recent tower inspection highlighted significant problems, necessitating refurbishment and rebushing of the Treble, 3rd and 4th clappers. The leather bell pads need replacing on 4th, 5th and Tenor, and 7 of the 8 pulley boxes require removal for a complete overhaul and rebuild. Work is scheduled for late September, with a return to ringing sometime later.

The bells at St John the Evangelist, Caldecott, are also going to need some work and refurbishment. All six bells require rebushing of the clappers at some expense.

With the tower silent during the lockdowns Jackdaws were able to get into the tower, where they made nests and reared young. The resulting debris has been cleared but work is required to replace mesh to the windows to prevent a repeat situation. The required work is not preventing ringing at the current time.

During the pandemic lockdowns of 2020/21 four Quarter Peals were achieved by Harry and Mary Poyner on hand bells, rung in the garden of their home in Whissendine. The first, because they could; the next to celebrate their 61<sup>st</sup> Wedding Anniversary. In February 2021 their QP was for the conductor's (Harry) 90<sup>th</sup> birthday. They rang a fourth QP in a personal tribute to HRH the Duke of Edinburgh in April 2020.

Since the return to ringing, two Quarter Peals have been rung in Rutland and a Peal is planned for October.

Following a Taylors inspection, we have now had work completed on one of the beams in our Belfry. They had identified that, over an unknown period, the beam between the 5th and 6th Bells had become warped and was in danger of causing the 5th to stick at some point, which would have been very unfriendly. The work took two days during June with me (Andy, Tower Captain) acting as unpaid assistant. This saved us almost £2K but the job still cost around £3K. Grants have been applied for to help us with the cost. The bells may not sound any better, but the work completed should at least ensure that they last for a good many more years to come.

#### **Irchester**

We have started ringing again at Irchester. We have rung for 2 weddings and have begun our practices and Sunday Service ringing.

During the past 18 months we have lost 4 ringers for various reasons and are now looking for new recruits.

#### **Ecton**

New ropes were purchased after a period of fund raising. The ringers are very grateful to the villagers, who provided almost all the funding, including some neighbours of the church yard, so we must be doing something right!

#### **Stanwick**
